Dear Parents:

Alabama law requires all children between the ages of seven and seventeen to attend school. If any child fails to attend school without legal excuse, that child and the person having custody of that child will be referred

to the juvenile court. At IAH, students are allowed only 16 absences a year (10 unexcused ones).

Any child who is prosecuted for truancy may be placed in a juvenile facility or in long-term residential care.






Our Third, Fourth, and Fifth grade students visited the national weather Service's Huntsville office, and left a great impression with their interest, attention, and good questions.

with our Annual fundraising.


Arrangements will be made for the Cultural Fair celebration to be combined with our fundraising events.

Get a head start!



Science Fair:

Science Fair will be during the week of January 23rd-27th. We have devoted a whole page in November Newsletter for you to get a head start. All projects will be due on January 23rd.

There are many sites that can help you to come up with good



ideas for the project. Make sure science projects are grade- appropriate. Don't be afraid of trying a new, challenging project that can teach you a whole lot! If

you are not sure if the project is appropriate for your grade level, please check with your teacher. We encourage use to integrate Quranic support in your project if possible.

Steps to Prepare a Science Fair Project (Grades 1-5th)

- 1. Select a Topic (Turn in your topics by "Dec 2nd or before" to your teacher to make sure they are OK!) See the list of projects and find out "What Makes a Good Project?" Remember a Science Fair Project is a test you do to find an answer to a question, not just showing what you know about something.
- **2. Gather Background Information** Gather information about your topic from books, magazines, the Internet, people and companies.

Keep notes about where you got your info (References).

3. Scientific Method State the Purpose of your experiment - What are you trying to find out?

Select a variable (something you will change/vary) that will help you find your answer.

States your Hypothesis - your guess about what the answer will be.

Decide on and describe how you will change the thing you selected.

Decide on and describe how you will measure your results.

4. Run Controlled Experiment and Record Data Do the experiment as described above.

Keep notes in one place. Write down everything you can think of, you might need it later.

- **5.** Graphs and Charts What happened? Answer that question, then put the results in graphs and charts.
- **6.** Construct an Exhibit or Display It has to be neat, but it does NOT have to be typed.

Make it fun, but be sure people can understand what you did.

Show that you used the Scientific Method.

7. Write a short Report Tell the story of your project tell what you did and exactly how you did it. Include a page that shows where you gathered

background information. It can be 2 pages or even more.

- **8. Practice Presentation to Judges** Practice explaining your project to someone (parent, friend, grandparent, etc.) This will help you be calm on Science Fair Day. The judges are very nice and will be interested in what you did and what you learned.
- 9. Come to the Fair and have fun! See you there!

Become better parents:



According to an occupational therapist with 10 years of experience working with children, parents, and teachers, "our children are getting worse in many aspects. I have seen and continue to see a decline in kids' social, emotional, and academic functioning, as well as a sharp increase in learning disabilities and other diagnoses." Today's children come to school emotionally unavailable for learning, and there are many factors in our modern lifestyle that contribute to this.

1. Technology

Using technology as a "Free babysitting service" is, in fact, not free at all. The payment is waiting for you just around the corner. We pay with our kids' nervous systems, with their attention, and with their ability for delayed gratification. Compared to virtual reality, everyday life is boring. Parental emotional availability is the main nutrient for child's brain. Unfortunately, we are gradually depriving our children of that nutrient.

2. Kids get everything they want the moment they want

"I am Hungry!!" "In a sec I will stop at the drive thru" "I am Thirsty!" "Here is a vending machine." "I am bored!" "Use my phone!" The ability to delay gratification is one of the key factors for future success. We have the best intentions -- to make our children happy -- but unfortunately, we make them happy at the moment but miserable in the long term. To be able to delay gratification means to be able to function under stress. Our children are gradually becoming less equipped to deal with even minor stressors, which eventually become huge obstacles to their success in life.

3. Kids rule the world

"My son doesn't like vegetables." "She doesn't like going to bed early." "He doesn't like to eat breakfast." "She doesn't like toys, but she is very good at her iPad" "He doesn't want to get dressed on his own." "She is too lazy to eat on her own." This is what I hear from parents all the time. Since when do children dictate to us how to parent them? If we leave it all up to them, all they are going to do is eat macaroni and cheese and bagels with cream cheese, watch TV, play on their tablets, and never go to bed. Without proper nutrition and a good night's sleep, our kids come to school irritable, anxious, and inattentive. In addition, we send them the wrong message. They learn they can do what they want and not do what they don't want. The concept of "need to do" is absent.

4. Endless Fun

We have created an artificial fun world for our children. There are no dull moments. The moment it becomes quiet, we run to entertain them again, because otherwise, we feel that we are not doing our parenting duty. We live in two separate worlds. They have their "fun" world, and we have our "work" world. Why aren't children helping us in the kitchen or with laundry? Why don't they tidy up their toys? This is basic monotonous work that trains the brain to be workable and function under "boredom," which is the same "muscle" that is required to be eventually teachable at school. When they come to school and it is time for handwriting their answer is "I can't. It is too hard. Too boring."

5. Limited social interaction

We are all busy, so we give our kids digital gadgets and make them "busy" too. Kids used to play outside, where, in unstructured natural environments, they learned and practiced their social skills. Unfortunately, technology replaced the outdoor time. Also, technology made the parents less available to socially interact with their kids. Obviously, our kids fall behind... the babysitting gadget is not equipped to help kids develop social skills. Most successful people have great social skills. This is the priority! 
What's happening in...
